Course Description

In this course we will survey C.S. Lewis's primary works and two of his fictional works to see how Lewis understood the central tenets of Christian faith and their inter-relationships. We will also consider how Lewis communicated the Christian faith in his context through his fiction and how we might more faithfully communicate the Christian gospel in our day.

Reading assignments will be taken from the required texts and from "on reserve" readings of several essays. It is recommended that the required texts be purchased.

C. S. Student Learning Outcomes

Students will:

- a. describe the major theological themes and their inter-relationships as developed by Lewis, including his understanding of the Christian life. (Through readings and class discussion accounted for in the reading notebook online forums.)
- b. analyze and critique aspects of Lewis's thought and arguments in the light of Scripture, relevant ecumenical creeds of the church and contemporary expressions of evangelical theology with some reference to

a few of his contemporary critics. (Through readings and accounted for in reading notebook and online discussions)

- c. draw from Lewis's thought in a way that contributes to the student's own ability to more faithfully articulate key theological themes and thereby enrich their own ministry, preaching, teaching and personal lives as members of the Body of Christ in its local and global expressions. (Through the forums, reading notebook entries, final paper and final exam)
- d. identify, appreciate and reflect critically upon how Lewis understood and attempted to relate with theological faithfulness literary form and theological content in his writings. (Through online forums and accounted for in the reading notebook and final exam)

Course Assignments

Overview

- Completion of all assigned reading of required texts and essays due prior to participating in class forums. This amounts to 900 pages of reading, accounted for in the Reading Notebook and the Reading Report List. (30% of grade).
- 2) Reading all instructor prompts or instructions sent during the assigned week, about 1 hour per week.
- 3) Submitting a one page Autobiographical Sketch for the instructor and the rest of the class participants the first week of class.
- 4) Participation in two weekly online Forums: One entry per week on the Instructors Forum and two entries per week on the class discussion forum. (25% of grade)
- 5) Completion of one 2-3 page Short Essay making use of one of Lewis's imaginative elements to communicate a theological truth.
- (15% of Grade)
- 6) Completion of the Final take-home exam (30% of grade)

Reading Assignments

You will find due dates for the readings listed in the separate "Course Outline and Required Reading Assignment Schedule" document.

-You will also be provided, separately, a "Suggested Reading Plan" which will assure that you read the correct material for any given week but also help you read on average the same number of pages per week. The Plan will recommend that you read parts of longer books ahead of time so that you don't have to read more than the average of 90 pages in any one week.
