CH501 Church History: The First Millennium

Course description

Church History 501: The First Millennium is a survey of the events, people, and ideas of Christianity from Jesus's ascension to the "Great Schism" of 1054. The focus is on mastering the key events and cultural contexts of each period and how they affected God's people. The course introduces the student to the challenges facing the church as it developed and the devotional legacies, writings, and leaders of the church's first millennium that resulted from it. Proctored final exam.

Estimated workload: For a student to do well in this course, the student will need to invest a total of 150 hours, or about 12-15 hours per week of reading, participating on the website, and writing papers.

Requirements and assignments (General Description)

- 1) **Read the lectures.** Lectures will be posted each Monday for the first ten weeks. This will take 1-2 hours per week.
- 2) **Read the textbooks.** Students should allow around five hours a week to read.
- 3) **Participate in online forum discussions.** In most courses, part of the learning that occurs comes through discussion and interaction with the instructor and other students. In an online class, this is done through comments posted on a discussion forum. This counts for 10 percent of the final grade.
- 4) **Quiz.** Open book, multiple choice quiz. This assignment will count for 10 percent of the final grade.
- 5) **Two book reports.** One on the text by Jenkins, the other selected from the list of additional texts. Each report will be worth 20 percent of the final grade.
- 6) **Final exam.** Multiple answer quiz and three-page response paper. This assignment will count for 40 percent of the final grade.
