



## TH502 Jesus Christ, the Nature of Humans and Salvation

### Short Syllabus

Instructor: Gary Deddo, PhD

### Course description

This course explores the person and work of Jesus Christ the incarnate Son of God according to biblical revelation. In that light we also consider the nature of the salvation accomplished and offered in and through Jesus Christ and by the Holy Spirit. This will include reflecting on the nature of human beings, of evil, and the inherent effects of sin. Issues of predestination and how we receive and participate in that saving relationship with our Triune God are studied.

Estimated workload: For a student to do well in this course, the student will need to invest a total of 145 hours, or about 12 hours per week of reading, participating on the website, and writing papers.

## Requirements and assignments

1. **Read the lessons/lectures/handouts.** They will be posted each Monday for the first ten or eleven weeks.
2. **Participate.** In most courses, part of the learning that occurs comes through discussion and interaction with the instructor and other students. In an online class, this is done through comments posted on a discussion forum. This counts for 20 percent of the final grade.
3. **Read the textbooks.** They total about 500 pages, or about 50 pages each week. This is required.
4. **Keep a Reading Assignment Notebook.** This counts for 20 percent of the final grade.
5. **Papers.** This counts for 40 percent of the final grade. We estimate that you will need about 40 hours to work on these papers – an average of 4 hours per week – some weeks more, some less.
6. **Final Exam.** This counts for 20 percent of the final grade.
